These hui are not intended to replace coming home for wānanga, but to create local spaces where whānau can connect, learn, and strengthen their Ngāti Kuiatanga together. HAUORA POP-UPS

You may have noticed hauora pop-ups at some of our recent events. These pop-ups are about removing barriers to good-quality healthcare by bringing services directly to whānau, in spaces where people already feel comfortable. Preventative care is a key focus. We often take our cars in for a Warrant of Fitness more regularly than we do our own bodies. Through these pop-ups, we've already seen the impact of early checks, with several whānau able to get expert advice and clear treatment plans on the same day. If you see us at an event, don't be shy, come and have a kōrero with us and take home a goody bag.



TE MORE - THE PRESENT

Ngā Kanohi Kārearea – Te Mahere Whakahaere Taiao o Ngāti Kuia, our Iwi Environmental Management Plan can now be found on our website. Ngā Kanohi Kārearea represents whānau voice, shaped by our dedicated rōpū taiao. Our environmental management plan is grounded in whakapapa, mātauranga Māori and the lived responsibilities of Ngāti Kuia as Hunga Tiaki (Guardians | Kaitiaki). The plan provides a clear, values-based framework guiding the protection, restoration and care of Te Kupenga o Kuia, now and into the future. Such a framework strengthens the role of environmental decision-makers, setting expectations for genuine partnership. This is a key step towards ensuring future generations inherit resilient, healthy places and spaces, respected and restored through time.

NAYLAND ROAD HOUSING

Our Nayland Road Houses are almost complete! This opportunity is for whānau currently renting in Te Tauihu, or those relocating to Nelson while saving for their first home. These homes provide short-term, affordable rental options for whānau who have begun their journey toward home ownership but are a year or two away from buying their own home. These are fixed-term homes that allow whānau time to save, stabilise finances, and prepare for ownership with support. Whānau who complete financial literacy training with Ka Uruora will be prioritised. The homes are warm, dry, and close to local amenities. Properties will be managed by Nelson Tasman Housing Trust. HELP SHAPE OUR HAUORA STRATEGY

We are developing a hauora strategy to better support the health and wellbeing of our whānau and we need your voice to guide it. Your kōrero will help shape priorities and support changes that improve hauora across our rohe, alongside the mahi of the Te Kāhui Hauora o Te Tauihu Iwi Māori Partnership Board (IMPB). VEIN CARE FOR WHĀNAU

The rūnanga is supporting whānau access to early vein care through free ultrasound scanning and treatment for those most impacted by varicose veins. We've partnered with a private clinic in Te Tauihu to provide this kaupapa outside the public health system, but spaces are limited. 
KA URUORA
