TE REO KIA REWA

Kei te hāpai ō, me kore ake koutou! Our annual Te Reo Kia Rewa was held back in April. The focus this year was on our tipuna, Kupe. There was an amazing play created by our tamariki about Kupe, alongside mau rākau, games, laughter, and waiata shared by all. Te Reo Kia Rewa is a whānau kaupapa for people aged 0 - 100, celebrating the revitalisation and enjoyment of te reo Māori within Ngāti Kuia.

TE MORE - THE PRESENT

TE TUHI O TE WHENUA: PAKOHE UNEARTHED

Nelson Provincial Museum 22 June - 13 October

This marks the regions first public celebration of pakohe, a precious and culturally significant resource, in Te Tauihu o te Waka-a-Māui. Curated by Ngāti Kuia, Pupuri Taonga o Te Taiao, and Nelson Provincial Museum, and presented in collaboration with ngā iwi of Te Tauihu, the exhibition celebrates the strength, versatility, and resilience of pakohe and its carvers over centuries.

Pakohe (metasomatised argillite) has been used by iwi Māori for centuries to create tools such as toki (adzes), whao (chisels), and māripi (knives), valued for their strength and sharpness. Toki Pakohe were prized not only as tools but also as symbols of mana. Found in Te Rohe Pakohe (the Nelson Mineral Belt), pakohe from Te Tauihu was highly sought after and key to an early trade economy, found in archaeological sites across Aotearoa.

For the descendants of early stone workers and traders, the exhibition opening was an emotional event. Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Kuia Kaitiaki, Hina-i-te-Māra Moses-Te Kani, emphasised the importance of this long-awaited celebration, stating, "Pakohe is an intrinsic part of our identity as Ngāti Kuia in Te Tauihu... It is overwhelming that after so many years, we are able to stand here and finally celebrate and acknowledge a taonga that is so important to us."

Moses-Te Kani highlighted Ngāti Kuia's continuous association with Te Rohe Pakohe, noting that the modern revitalisation of pakohe is thanks to contemporary pakohe workers and artists upholding the associated mātauranga and tikanga. She acknowledged Master Carvers Toro Frank Wells, Ruihana Smith, Fayne Robinson, and artist Natalie Kere, quoting Toro Frank: "Because we are te lwi Pakohe, it is us."

KING SALMON APOLOGY

We wish to share an important milestone that took place at Te Hora Marae on Wednesday, 22 May 2024. The King Salmon executive team met with us kanohi ki te kanohi, led by our whanaunga Graeme Aldridge, to address a past hara. The purpose was for King Salmon Aotea to apologise for the historic hara where our Kaitiaki Kaikaiāwaro was held in disrespect. Raymond Smith highlighted that Ngāti Kuia holds Kaikaiāwaro in the highest esteem. Many Ngāti Kuia descendants have kirimoko depicting Kaikaiāwaro.

Mark Dewdney, Chairman of King Salmon, acknowledged the harm, saying: "This is not something we are proud of. We unreservedly apologise for our deeply offensive public comments. They were belittling to your tīpuna Kaikaiāwaro and your fundamental beliefs. We regret not acting sooner to condemn these comments." CEO Carl Carrington added: "The transgression of the past was wrong. I think its genesis was arrogance, ignorance, and a lack of cultural awareness regarding the history of Te Tauihu and the whakapapa of Ngāti Kuia. I hope you feel the genuine intent of our words today, and our actions will be the proof. Ka mua, ka muri". We move forward learning from the past.

Tania Alesana accepted the apology on behalf of Ngāti Kuia. While these words and photos do not capture all the moments of the day, the feeling was positive and constructive, paving the way for future collaboration and partnership.
